23 you will, but can you tell us, was it one person or two
24 persons that came by?

25 A. One person.

20 Q. And when you signed the envelope, if you
21 remember, was it open or closed?

22 A. It was open.

23 Q. Okay. What happened to the envelope? Did --
24 was it left with you?

25 A. No, he took it.

19 MR. WOOD: No objection to 63, Your Honor.
